Greetings from the Pastor...

Over the years I have had people ask me, "Why does the church ask us to make a financial commitment? Isn't just giving what I can enough?" My initial feeling is that the people asking the question don't really want to hear an answer – they want the opportunity to tell me all the reasons they can't – or won't – make a commitment to the ministry of their congregation. I usually find myself defending the practice making a financial commitment to a congregation like Hope Lutheran by telling my story of tithing – and I know sometimes it falls on deaf ears.

As we approach another Consecration Sunday when we will ask you to write down your estimate of giving for 2012, I am reminded how important it is to give thanks to God for what we have and recommit our time, talent and treasure to God's ministry here at Hope. I am a big fan of this habit and here are five reasons why:

1. Taking Time to Assess What You Value

It has been said, "Show me your checking account and I can tell you what is important in your life." Taking time to reflect on your gifts as a household and how you spend your money is a great way to see what you value and how you can share your blessings. These things are at the core of discipleship and spiritual growth.

2. Sharing - not Losing

I can remember the time before I became a tither. Whenever I would sit in the pews and see the offering plate coming, I would fumble through my wallet. It was an awkward moment while I hoped for a bill that was "enough," but "not too much." I will admit now that tossing that crumpled bill into the plate felt more like losing than sharing. Giving sporadically and last minute does not usually feel generous and that is because it comes from a moment of pressure that does not make time for the reflection I mentioned above. *Planning to give* connects us to our offering in a thoughtful and joyful way that can transform our understanding of sharing what we have.

3. Worthy Gifts

Many people do not make a commitment because they don't think the amount they give is worthy of being proclaimed and promised ahead of time. Yikes – where did they get that idea??!! Whether you commit to sharing \$1 or \$1,000 a week, *it matters and it makes a difference*. Whatever you have to give is worthy of being shared.

4. Word and Deed

Making a promise and acting on it again and again is a physical lesson about God's love for us. God never ceases to offer us life and forgiveness through Jesus Christ. Making a commitment is a bold and simple way to respond to God's love and action in our lives.

5. Moving God's Kingdom Forward

Have you ever watched commitment cards pile up in a basket or offering plate? Those promises add up to do miraculous things in the name of God. Committing to share your gifts means standing together with your Christian brothers and sisters in ministry and mission for a purpose beyond yourself. It means trusting that together our gifts are abundantly more than enough to change the world!

So there you have it – 5 great reasons why it is important for you to give – important for your own spiritual life and important to the life of the church. May God open your heart this year as you complete your Estimate of Giving Card.

CONSECRATION SUNDAY IS COMING – OCTOBER 23, 2011

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Our congregation's finance committee has selected the *New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program* as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. *New Consecration Sunday* encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world.

Every attendee and member who completes an *Estimate of Giving Card* does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship our guest leader will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration Sunday team and governing board members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

"One has made at least a start on discovering the meaning of human life when one plants trees under which one knows full well he or she will never sit." D. Elton Trueblood



This is a beautiful statement on giving. So much of the giving that we witness in life comes with the expectation of some sort of gratification in return, either in the form of thanks or recognition, that sometimes we lose sight of what true giving is meant to be. But there is in our hearts a concept of true giving, and that is giving with absolutely no conditions or expectations attached. If I plant a shade tree today that won't mature for forty or fifty years, I can almost guarantee you that I won't be around when others are enjoying its shade--and that should not matter to me one bit.

But it doesn't stop there. Trueblood here tells us that this giving is "a start on discovering the meaning of human life." Can he really be saying that giving is behind the meaning of life? Perhaps it could be true, for unconditional giving can be the result of a grateful attitude for all the God has given us and of unconditional love and respect for our fellow human beings. And perhaps that's what life and love are all about.

There are many things that I can give today for which I'll never see any results. A compliment here, a bit of encouragement there, a smile over there, and I'll be planting seeds of positiveness, seeds that I won't see grow into whole trees or even tiny flowers, but which most certainly will be positive parts of this world in which we all live. And, I imagine, my giving unconditionally to the church will result in planting seeds of ministry which I may never see but which will carry on the work of Jesus for years to come.

BLESSING OF THE ANIMALS - OCTOBER 2ND AT 12:00 PM

St. Francis of Assisi saw all of God's creation – especially the animals – as partners. Many stories have been told about his love for animals. It is said that, one day, while Francis was traveling with some companions, they happened upon a place in the road where birds filled the trees on either side. Francis told his companions to "wait for me while I go to preach to my sisters the birds". The birds surrounded him, intrigued by the power of his voice, and not one of them flew away. The tale is told that St. Francis on his deathbed thanked his donkey for carrying and helping him throughout his life, and his donkey wept.

Another legend tells that in the city of Gubbio, where Francis lived for some time, was a wolf who devoured men as well as animals. Francis had compassion upon the townsfolk, and went up into the hills to find the wolf. When he found the wolf, he made the sign of the cross and commanded the wolf to come to him and hurt no one. Miraculously the wolf closed his jaws and lay down at the feet of St. Francis. "Brother Wolf, you do much harm in these parts and you have done great evil...", said Francis. "All these people accuse you and curse you... But brother wolf, I would like to make peace between you and the people". Then Francis led the wolf into the town, and surrounded by startled citizens made a pact between them and the wolf. Because the wolf had "done evil out of hunger", the townsfolk were to feed the wolf regularly, and in return, the wolf would no longer prey upon them or their flocks. To show the townspeople that they would not be harmed, St. Francis blessed the wolf.

Many churches throughout the world celebrate St. Francis' legacy by holding a service to "bless the animals." Hope Lutheran will be holding a Service of Blessing for the Animals on Sunday, October 2^{nd} at 12:00 PM in the grassy area by the pavilion. Come and bring your pet – whatever it may be – to be blessed. There will be a brief service and time for fellowship among the animals! In case of inclement weather the service will be held in Kuntz Hall.

BELL CHOIR UPDATE: Our bell program has undergone some restructuring as we begin our fourth full year of ringing. Several ringers have decided to stop ringing, and auditions were held with the hopes of creating a bell choir for strong music readers. The result is we will have one three-octave bell choir and one small bell ensemble. The bell choir will begin weekly 6:30 PM Tuesday rehearsals on September 20th, with plans to ring a monthly anthem, the first one in October. The small ensemble will not rehearse weekly, but rather target three or four services throughout the year at which to ring, and rehearse four to six weeks prior to each of the targeted services.

NEW "CHURCH SECURITY" INFORMATION

A few months ago, at the recommendation of the property committee, the congregation council made a decision to limit access to our facility on weekdays and weekends by not having all the doors to the building unlocked at all hours. Many of our members have been used to the church being open all the time so communicating this information is important. Please take note: **Weekdays and evenings** – the only door that will be unlocked will be the double glass doors on the large parking lot side of the building. WHY DO WE HAVE WATER IN THE FONT DURING COMMUNION SERVICES?

During our baptism – no matter how young or old we were – the pastor dipped his or her finger in oil and made the sign of the cross on our foreheads saying the words, "you have been sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever." It was a sign communicating the presence of the Holy Spirit and uniting us with Jesus. Even though we may not be able to see it when we look in the mirror, that cross is a permanent, indelible and eternally durable sign that reminds us we are a child of God. By dipping our fingers in the water and making the sign of the cross on our foreheads we recall that act from our baptism and remember that as God's children we are called to live as children of God -bearing witness to the world. In remembrance of your baptism you may wish to dip your finger into the water and make the sign of the cross on your forehead as you come forward for communion.

THE IRA ROLLOVER IS BACK--AGAIN!

In December 2010 the **US Congress extended the IRA Rollover to 31 December 2011**. This act allows donors 70 ½ or older to make gifts up to \$100,000 from their Traditional or Roth IRA directly to a charity without any Federal tax implications this year. (This law does not apply to a 401k, 403b or other qualified pension accounts.)

The donor does not have to pay income tax on the withdrawal nor does the donor receive a charitable tax deduction. Furthermore, the donation does not count against the maximum charitable gifts allowed in any year. The charitable gift cannot be used to fund a Life Income Agreement like a Charitable Gift Annuity or a Charitable Remainder Trust nor can it be donated to a Donor Advised Fund but can be used to fulfill a campaign pledge. The withdrawal to make a charitable gift can be used to satisfy the IRA required minimum distribution required by law. Please note: IRA plan administrators must make the check in the name of the charity but can send the check to the donor for delivery.
