The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year with the theme "Always Being Made New" – a theme based on the text from 2 Corinthians 5:17 where Paul writes, "So if anyone

is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!"

Forty years ago two Lutheran congregations - St. Paul's, Indianland and Christ, Little Moore – came together to form Hope Lutheran Church - a new and dynamic congregation. If I had to say one thing about our congregation it is that we, too, are always being made new! Now sometimes that newness comes in the form of new ministries - like our prayer shawl group or new bible studies. And sometimes that newness comes in the form of new ways of doing old things – like the ways our Worship Arts Team helps to enhance Sunday morning worship or Joe Neupauer, our new member and the drummer who plays during worship. And sometimes that newness comes in the form of facility updates!

The ceiling and the walls in the sanctuary have also been repainted. A portion of the costs to do these updates was covered by insurance, some was donated by a member family and the rest was covered from the building fund. The results are refreshing and welcoming!

Many thanks to Al Rock, Earl Snyder and our entire property committee (Kim Belletti, Ralph Fisher, Arnie Kuhns, Charlie Kutzler, Justin Maurer, Tony Pagotto, Stanley Royer, Ed Tretiak, Wayne Weidner, David Zehner) who are overseeing this project and making sure we are disrupted as little possible during the renovations. They are a group of people who work behind the scenes to make sure our facility is safe and secure and that we continue to maintain this large facility. STEWARDSHIP CORNER

The Bondage of Stuff by Jerry Hoffman



My wife and I have been on a number group tours. We enjoy them and the people who share the experiences. Each person is allowed one suitcase and one carry on. But as the trip

continues, we shop. The luggage relatively light at the beginning gets heavier. The expandable luggage expands. Then, new bags and packages are tucked under the arms and carried. "Precious, fragile" pieces need "special" treatment. Some request allowance of an extra suitcase.

As the stuff accumulates, so does our concern. We become anxious over the safety of our purchases: "Is it okay if I take these packages on the bus with me? I am afraid that they will get broken. I will hold them in my lap. I can't leave them in my room, because someone might break in and steal them."

Do you remember when Jesus looked sadly at a rich man and said: "How hard it is for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God? Indeed, it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." (Luke 18:24-25)

Rev. Marshall Pechauer recently shared with me his fond memory of a carving, which uniquely illustrates the story. Arnold Flaten, who was once chair of the art department at St. Olaf College, made a carving of a needle and a camel.

The needle was stationary and fastened to the frame of the carving. The camel was moveable. It had a full pack of goods on its back. However the pack of goods on its back was removable. With the goods on its back, the camel could not pass through the eye of the needle. However, when you remove the pack, it could. Stuff is a drag on life. Bondage to stuff keeps the traveler from fully participating in the adventure of a journey. Stewardship provides the opportunity for people to be freed from the bondage to stuff to participate more fully and freely in the journey.

DEALING WITH LOSS AND GRIEVING



Offered by Pastor Paulette Obrecht

In the 5th chapter of Matthew, in the verses known as the Beatitudes, Jesus told his disciples: "Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted."

All people at some time or another must deal with loss in their lives. And, even though a loss, such as moving out of a long-time home into a new residence, might seem small to others, it can nevertheless be a source of sadness and grieving to us. However, when we deal with the loss of a loved one in our lives, whether through death, divorce, a change in residence, or other circumstances, we normally experience a range of powerful emotions that can take much energy and time to acknowledge and live through before they lessen and allow us return to a level of normalcy. This period of dealing with our heightened feelings about loss is referred to a mourning – or grieving. Everyone who experiences the loss of a loved one grieves differently – in his or her own way. Through grieving, we struggle to understand our loss and grief, then, becomes the "healing" process for us. It is the journey that ultimately brings comfort in our pain.

These articles over the next months are meant to help those who grieve recognize that grieving is a natural and normal route that can help those who mourn find healthy ways to deal with their grief. If you would like to talk to someone about your grief issues – or you have questions you would like addressed in these reflections – please feel free to contact me. Next month, I will begin addressing common "stages" associated with grieving.

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS-JUNE 2013

- ✓ The council approved Finance Committee's recommendation to increase the amount of the scholarship we give from \$100.00 per semester to \$200.00 per semester beginning in the fall of 2013. Eligible students must have completed one year of college and be enrolled full-time to apply. Applications are on the website and are due in to the office by July 26th.
- The group who went to New Jersey to do some rebuilding from the damage of Hurricane Sandy will be doing a presentation in church this summer so that members can see how their contributions to the disaster relief fund were used.
- Council approved the installation of new carpeting for the three year old and four year old classrooms. Both rooms have carpeting with large tears in them that pose a tripping hazard and need to be replaced.
- The Constitution task force has completed their review of the constitution. It is being retyped with the changes for council to review, then be sent to the synod and finally to the congregation for approval.
- The sanctuary painting will begin on June 17th. Work on the fire and security system is already underway.
- Council discussed next steps on the parsonage rental and voted to retain a real estate management company to handle the parsonage.

The group of youth who attended the ELCA National Youth Gathering in New Orleans hosted a "thank you" brunch for people from the church who supported their efforts to get there. Youth, with the help of some adults and Stacey and Steph Ziegler, made pancakes, sausage, fruit and baked goods and offered a presentation to the attendees.

SUMMARY:

Expenses exceeded income in the Regular Fund for the month of May by \$7,391.91, and for the year 2013, expenses exceeded income by \$15,704.21, giving us a current balance in the Regular Fund of \$73,583.68. Last year the net income for the same period was \$22,391.77 with a balance of \$74,385.46.

Budget Comparison--Total Regular Fund Budget for 2013 is \$413,068.00. 21/52 of that figure is \$166,815.92. Our receipts in the Regular Fund for the five months were \$152,488.49. So, we are behind in income by \$14,327.43.

LEAVE A LEGACY

Have you given much thought about the Legacy you would like to leave after you join the Church Triumphant? Even with uncertainty about the future, you can and should make plans about your estate especially if you want charitable gifts to be part of your estate plan.

There are many ways to make a gift that does not jeopardize your financial wellbeing. For instance, the most used gifting method is a will. Eighty percent of the gifts received by congregations come from estates via a will. However, 60% of the people who die each year die without a will. Furthermore, less that 10% of the Lutherans who die each year remember their congregation in their will. The beauty of a will is that it does not require that you give up any of your assets while you are alive. The cost to write a will is minimal and a will is changeable if your charitable interests change. The place to start is by having a conversation with your pastor, an ELCA Charitable Gift Planner, and of course your attorney.

Another easy way to make an estate gift, which does not affect your current financial situation, is changing the beneficiary statement on an insurance policy, IRA, 401k, 403b, other retirement accounts and/or investment accounts. Simply call the plan administrator or account manager and ask for a change of beneficiary form. Generally, there is no cost to make this change. IRA, 401k, and 403b accounts create an ordinary tax liability for the inheritor of these accounts. So, using them to make charitable gifts can save on taxes for those who will benefit from your estate. For more details about how you can structure your estate to save your beneficiaries taxes, contact and ELCA Charitable Gift Planner for the details.

There are other ways to arrange your estate to make charitable gifts including gifts that may increase your income. It all depends on your financial situation, the assets you have, and the ministries you want to support. A good place to start is to have a conversation with an ELCA Charitable Gift Planner. ELCA Charitable Gift Planners are not advisors nor do they have anything to sell. However, they can provide you with information and the appropriate questions to ask your legal and financial advisor to help you support the ministry of your congregation or other ministries of the church.
