

GREETINGS FROM THE PASTOR... From Pastor Jami Possinger



Well... I am writing for the February newsletter and I thought, with Valentine's Day in February, what could be a better topic than love?! Actually... I was inspired to write about love when I read the following quote from the artist, Marc Chagall:

In our life, there is a single color, as on an artist's palette, which provides the meaning of art and life. It is the color of love.

I never really thought about love being a color – but I have often thought that if we want to provide meaning in our lives - then we must learn to love - and to love unconditionally. A seminary professor once said something like this in a lecture: Only when we learn how to love unconditionally can we truly feel the sense of completion that is already within ourselves, but that we keep repressed under the layers of fear and control and feelings of inadequacy. He went on to say this is one of the many secrets of life: when we learn to love unconditionally - we no longer need to fear - and we no longer need to protect ourselves. When unconditional love becomes a true way of life - all the time - then our lives will be so filled with that one color that we'll find that other colors no longer matter.

It is paradoxical but true – we finally learn to accept love from others when we've learned to give love ourselves. We learn to feel good about ourselves when we spend more time making others feel good about themselves. We feel the most peace when we do our best to help others find peace - without controlling or dominating them. And the key in all these situations is to do what we do with love and caring.

I have a friend who always used to feel sorry for herself because there wasn't enough love in her life - because love had somehow passed her by. What she thought was love, though, was actually dependence. She felt that her life had no meaning because she didn't have that "one love," the romantic love that we're taught is so important in our lives. But that's not what brings meaning to us. The love that brings meaning is the love that we give and share, the love between friends and even enemies, the giving of ourselves and our feelings with others who need to feel love.

Most of the people who give their love unconditionally don't even need to use the word "love." It's clear in their actions, in their self-reliance, in their gaze, in their way of being. And when we learn to paint our lives with that color, what a beautiful mixture of colors we'll receive in return as each person shares their own colors of love with us. Happy painting!

ASSISTANT PASTOR'S WORD...

This is the year of Matthew! Each Sunday (well, most Sundays), the gospel reading for this church year is from the book of Matthew. And, during the season of Epiphany in Matthew's year, we always read from the Sermon on the Mount. You know, the chapters that share things like the Beatitudes ("blessed

are the poor ..."), you are the salt of the earth, let your light so shine before others, turn the other cheek, and love your enemies. When these words were first spoken to the ordinary

people who gathered on a hill to listen to Jesus, they were amazed. No one had ever made them feel that valuable and important before. No one had ever spoken words such counter-cultural words that truly made sense to them.

Of course, this was not a message that people expected to hear from a messiah. There were a lot of things Jesus asked them to do that were tough to do. They would have to change their ways. They would have to look at those around them in a new way. They would have to put others first, and their wishes and desires would have to be put on a "back burner."

Welcome to the world of change!!

When I began reading commentaries on the gospel stories for the season of Epiphany, it made me think about the kinds of changes that we all have to deal with when we live together in community. What changes have you noticed lately in the life of the church that may be tough to deal with? Fewer people attending regularly, fewer volunteers and people involved in ongoing activities, changes in dress, in customs, in music, in decorations; new people involved in activities who have new ideas, new methods, new ways of worshipping, new ways of serving. Change, change, change. New. New. New. It's hard to keep up.

Yet, maybe, that's why Matthew reminds us: "Those who have walked in darkness have seen a great light." No matter what the challenges and changes we face in our lives, the words of Jesus travel with us – and so does his Holy Spirit, the Comforter. What an epiphany!

You're blessed when you get your inside world—your mind and heart—put right. Then you can see God in the outside world. You're blessed when you can show people how to cooperate instead of compete or fight. That's when you discover who you really are, and your place in God's family. — Matthew 5:8-9 (from The Message)

STEWARDSHIP CORNER Stewardship New Year's Resolutions

A few years ago I visited <u>Peace Lutheran Church</u> in Tacoma, WA as part of a research team from Luther Seminary. One of the members of Peace that we met was also staff at the community center housed within their congregation. When asked what stewardship looked like in his life, the man said that he chooses to give the resource that is hardest for him to give, and at that point in his life, it was time.

At the dawn of a new year, I find myself harkening back to that statement and wondering, "What is the hardest resource for me to give? What would it look like to give that first? What resource is most difficult for me to steward?" As I have reflected on these questions, I have the same answer as the man I met in Tacoma. The hardest resource for me to give and to steward is time.

Don't get me wrong, I volunteer for various organizations, including the church. But I still have this underlying belief that my time is mine to keep, to use, to organize or even to waste. There is a dichotomy between the time that I give away, or give to God, and the time that I have for myself. Yet, doesn't God care about how I use all of my time, not just the small percentage that I give away to worship, fellowship, spiritual practices and volunteering?

Like money, time is one of the many resources that God has entrusted to my care to serve both God and my neighbor. In 2014, I do not want to focus solely on the ways that God is calling me to give my time away to the church, but how God is calling me to use all of my time to share God's love and grace with the world. What is God calling me to do with all of my time on earth? How is God calling me to use my time to live into my many vocations: leader, fiancée, daughter, friend, Christian, neighbor, etc.?

I am continually struck by the story of the Good Samaritan in Luke chapter 10. I am convinced that this story is one of the best examples of what stewardship of your whole life looks like. What I find most striking about the story is that the Samaritan stops his journey, on a long, dangerous road, for the sake of his neighbor. He doesn't consider the time, his destination or his to-do list. Instead, he comes near the beaten and robbed man, sees him and is moved with compassion. This compassion alters the course of his entire day. He gives away his day to a stranger in need out of love and compassion.

As a person who organizes almost every day on a post-it note, this is a shockingly high-calling. What does it look like to be available to love your neighbor even when it isn't convenient? What does it look like to live

my life by the small tugs of the Holy Spirit rather than my clearly written to-do list? I resolve this year to listen closely to the ways that God is teaching me how to be a better steward of all of my time and helps me living into my Christian calling at all hours of the week, not just Sundays.

WE NEED YOUR HELP

The church, like every other organization to which we belong, has rules we must follow if we wish to maintain our membership. Those rules are found in the constitutions of both the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and Hope Church. You and I, and all other Lutherans, are required to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion and make a contribution of record at least once in each calendar year.

For Hope Church to maintain accurate membership records, you must do the following:

- 1) Receive Holy Communion <u>and complete the Hope Hospitality Pad at least once a year</u>. If you can't remember if you've done it previously in that year, do it again.
- 2) Make a contribution of record at least once a year. "Of record" means you must place your contribution in your giving envelope (or at least use your envelope number so we can identify and credit it to you). We can't credit a contribution of loose cash placed in the offering plate.

Parents and guardians are reminded that young persons who have been confirmed are members of the congregation to whom these provisions also apply. Please encourage and assist them in maintaining their membership.

Reflections on Dealing with Grief & Loss

No matter how emotionally strong and stable we believe we are, none of us is accustomed to the emotional upheaval that accompanies the loss of a loved one. People normally experience a wide variety of emotions after a loss – from not caring to relief to being on edge or to feeling angry or sad about everything. We can have mood swings that are hard for those around us to understand – and we often don't understand them ourselves. One minute we're okay, and the next minute we're in tears. This is how grief works.

Part of the process of grieving is realizing that we can only deal with the sadness and pain directly for so long – and then we need a break from it. We need to give our emotions a rest. And, it's good to realize this and accept it.


Dr. Elisabeth Kubler-Ross in her book *On Grief and Grieving* recommends figuring out what rests your emotions – and then do it – without guilt or judgment. If you find getting lost in movies, TV, music, a change of scenery, a trip away from it all, being outdoors, exercising, or just having *nothing* to do – then do it! At first, this break may feel forced or awkward, but stick with it. Since your life has changed its balance, it will take time to regain a sense of equilibrium.

Another good thing to try is spending time with others – with old friends or with new acquaintances. This effort to break away from our emotional states might be a good time to connect with a support group. Often, support groups can bring new people into your world. Many times, they are people who have been through the same things you have just experienced and they understand just what you are going through.

In next month's article, look for news about a grief support that will begin meeting here at Hope Church. We will wait until late March, when the weather will not interfere with meeting times, to begin our group. SUMMARY:

Income exceeded expenses in the Regular Fund for the month of December by \$27,873.21, and for the year 2013, expenses exceeded income by \$12,029.02, giving us a current balance in the Regular Fund of \$76,661.59. Last year the net income for the same period was \$37,099.57 with a balance of \$88,690.61.

Budget Comparison--Total Regular Fund Budget for 2013 is \$413,068.00. Our receipts in the Regular Fund for the twelve months were \$383,683.75. So, we are behind in income by \$29,384.25.
