

Expenses exceeded income in the Regular Fund for the month of February by \$13,186.33, and for the year 2014, expenses exceeded income by \$23,294.67, giving us a current balance in the Regular Fund of \$53,566.92. Last year the net income for the same period was \$(10,876.36) with a balance of \$77,814.25.

Budget Comparison--Total Regular Fund Budget for 2014 is \$416,769.00. 8/52 of that figure is \$64,118.31. Our receipts in the Regular Fund for the two months were \$48,971.09. So, we are behind in income by \$15,147.22.

ASSISTANT PASTOR'S WORD...

I like to collect sayings from inspirational writers and post them in a frame to hang on the wall. Just check out the walls in my office at Hope, if you think I'm exaggerating. Here's one I found a few years ago from Richard Bach, the author of *Jonathan Livingston Seagull*, a new-age book from 1970's: "What the caterpillar calls the end of the world, the Master calls a butterfly." It's a good saying to use at this time of the year – the season of Easter. Christians often use butterflies as symbols of the joy and transformation associated with the Resurrection of our Lord.

The butterfly is a powerful symbol of transformation. And, if you take a moment to think about the transformation of the Resurrection, you might notice it was not only Jesus who was changed. When the women at the tomb realized that Jesus was risen, they were transformed. When the two disciples who walked with the transformed

Jesus on the road to Emmaus realized they had seen the Lord, they too were changed. When the disciples began sharing their stories of the significance of Jesus in their lives, they emerged from the cocoons of their fearfulness and their "wings" were unraveled, giving them a sense of lightness and joy and new spirit in their lives.

The butterfly, in some cultures, serves as a reminder to make changes when the opportunity arises. They can serve as reminders to *us* to get up and move out of *our* cocoons. We have a risen opportunity to celebrate the gift of new life given to us through the death and

resurrection of Jesus Christ. Be filled with the joy of transformation! Share the story! Spread *your* wings and be filled with God's spirit. Dance with the butterflies.

# **COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS – JANUARY 2014**

- "Coffee with the Council" is a new opportunity the church council is offering to keep communications between the governing board and members flowing. #### **ARC Friendship Dance**

About 20 years ago, Darlene and Charlie Pioli moved to the Cherryville area and were looking for opportunities for developmentally-disabled young adults to socialize and have fun in a warm, accepting atmosphere. In New Jersey, there were monthly dances, but none were found in the Lehigh Valley. So Charlie and Darlene started their own. Hope Church agreed to provide the location, and ARC of Lehigh and Northampton Counties would help with sponsorship. ARC is an organization that offers advocacy services people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and provides support and networking to help individuals and families attain services. So, the combination of the Pioli's passion, Hope Church's *com*passion, and the organizational resources of ARC (plus a sprinkle of the Holy Spirit at work) resulted in the creation of ARC Friendship Dances.

But, that was only the start. Once word got out, local DJ Tony Allen offered to "spin records". The "kids" who attend have grown to love Tony and his of music, especially when he plays special sets of songs. Then, parents, caregivers, and a few members of the community volunteered to help chaperone and provide refreshments. Students from LCCC Occupational Therapy Assistant Program regularly serve as volunteers as part of their training. Students from Northampton High School expanded their volunteer efforts by forming the "Peer Helper" program in special education classes in their school. Many of them go on to become special education teachers. "Kids", their families, and caregivers from all over the Valley began attending these dances, some from as far away as Quakertown and Easton.

A few years ago, as volunteers dwindled, the Pioli's put a notice in Hope's bulletin asking for help – and Judy Dieter, as well as members of Hope Social Ministry Committee stepped up to help. The dances, thus far, have been financially self-sufficient, with each dancer paying \$5 admission to cover the cost of the DJ and refreshments and there are usually funds left over to make a donation to Hope for providing space.

Next year, Darlene will pass the torch to Judy Dieter. Charlie and Darlene, and Judy, hope and pray that these dances – and this important ministry – will continue. # Reflections on Dealing with Grief & Loss

Hope Church will begin offering a grief support group so people have the opportunity to help one another through the grieving process. The group will begin meeting on Wednesday, April 23, beginning at 7 PM. We will plan on meeting for 12 weeks and use materials from the Grief Sharing series. It will be open to people from Hope Church and from the community at large. A sign-up sheet is now available on the bulletin board in the Narthex. In Linda Perrone Rooney's book *Praying Our Grief*: Comfort and Prayers for Widows, she writes about using prayer as a support and refuge. Here are some thoughts from her, with modifications:

Everything changed when our loved one died. It might have felt like a tidal had overtaken us – or an like an earthquake knocked us off your feet and sent us reeling. Is there nothing to which we can cling? Is there no one whose enduring support we can count on?

These are the same kinds of thoughts expressed by the psalmists and by Job. Their writings might provide some comfort – for in their laments we witness souls unafraid to throw themselves on the Lord, with faith in God's answers.

Prayer, the lifting of our minds and hearts to God, is truly the glue that binds us to this world and gives us entry into the next. Prayer comes in many forms: the simple, spontaneous words of conversation with God; formal prayers in a book; corporate prayer with a community of people; the unspoken, silent prayer of the heart. The form isn't important. Prayer is the rock on which we can build our lives.

In prayer, we meet the One whose presence is healing and whose love is unconditional. In prayer, we find the One who knows our needs, who is comfortable with our tears and who doesn't hide from our distress. God is the one who longs to give us all that our heart desires.

If you don't already have a time of prayer set aside in your day ... begin today. At first you might start with a time of quietness and tranquility. Later, you might use a prayer book or read the scriptures. Eventually, as your are faithful to your time with God, you will find your heart expressing its deepest thoughts and feelings. The next step is to wait – and receive the response of One who knows you inside-out.

Here is Linda Rooney's prayer for you:

Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, give me the words to tell you what it feels like to lose a loved one – how much I miss this person in my life. Help me to spill the thoughts and feelings of my heart and to leave time and room to listen for your response. Offer me a glimpse of your strength and unconditional regard. Let me cling to you in my grief so that I might rejoice with you in the days to come. Amen.

# "Why I'm Getting a Divorce in 2014"

Jarrid is a husband, pastor, author, and blogger. Recently, he wrote a shocking public confession on his blog. He writes: Before you start assuming I will be leaving my wife, let me just tell you that's just simply not the case. I'm looking to leave someone else. Someone you may not know about. Someone who takes up most of my time, distracts me from spending time with my wife, and even spends time with me during the late hours of the night.

Her name is iPhone 5. She's extremely smart, funny, reliable, and keeps me up to date with all the latest trends. And although she's always by my side, I can't help but notice that she is keeping me from spending time with the people who matter most in my life: God, my wife, my family, and my dreams.

She's really good at keeping my attention. So much so that I've been known to completely ignore people when they are trying to have a conversation with me. She tempts me to use her apps while at church, weddings and funerals, instead of enjoying the moment undistracted. She even keeps me from working on personal projects that have strict deadlines.

She's extremely insensitive when it comes to my safety, and is always tempting me to be with her while I drive. I can't help but notice she is slowly infecting my social life, my marriage, and the lives of those around me. Many people act like it's no big deal, but I imagine the longer one ignores this issue, the worse one's personal relationships will be affected in the long run.

We need to bring our phones back to being an accessory, not a priority. 2014 Challenge: Divorce your phone, your apps, your social-feeds, and engage in relationships with people that actually matter. Vow to spend a significant amount of time off your mobile-devices, unplugged, and instead get back to making personal relationships that will stand the test of time.

Other than God, my wife deserves to be the #1 priority in my life and I don't want anything to get in the way of that. The reality is, we're all married to our phones in one way or another.

Mind you. Not everyone struggles with this. But I hope you will take this into consideration regardless.

- 1. Learn to balance the time you spend on your phone.
- 2. Make your phone an accessory rather than a priority.
- 3. Give yourself limitations as to when and where your phone can be used.
- 4. Control how you use your phone, and stop allowing your phone to control you.
- 5. Try spending parts of your weekends unplugged, offline, and away from your mobile device.

In 2014, I vow to divorce my phone. Will you join me? Share this with a friend, and let's get the "Divorce Your Phone" movement going.

A recent survey by the Barna Group, a California research firm, found that 16% of those who observe Lent planned to curtail their use of sites like Facebook and Twitter part of their 40-day fast. If the figures are calculated to include those who are giving up other forms of technology, the survey suggests 48% of practicing Protestants and 31% of practicing Christians are "fasting from technology".
