

GREETINGS FROM THE PASTOR...

By the time you read this newsletter article we will be getting ready to ring in the New Year 2016. As I anticipate this, I cannot help but wonder what the year will bring. Most definitely there will be lots of things that are not on my radar right now. But there will be things of which I am certain... another notch on my age belt... a presidential election... the constant threat of terrorist attacks around the world... new opportunities for ministry here at Hope... new ways to live our lives.

And that got me to thinking about how I might look at life with a different view this year – how I might be very conscious about how I perceive things and how I am perceived. This struck me because I recently read a quote by Zig Ziglar who said, "When you choose to be pleasant and positive in the way you treat others, you have also chosen, in most cases, how you are going to be treated by them."

I know people who never make an effort to be pleasant and positive to others – and who were constantly complaining about how other people treat them. It is astonishing to me to hear them complain about how others act when I know how they treat others. The reality is that every person longs to be recognized as a unique, caring individual with needs and wants and hopes and dreams. Every one of us longs to be treated with dignity and respect – and not walked all over. Truth is – if we treat other people poorly we're going to be treated poorly, too.

A friend shared what she observed recently when she was on a short vacation. A couple came to the front desk of the hotel – not just once, but several times. To my friend, it was quite obvious that they were looking for a big discount or an upgrade to a different room. They said just one of the staff lied to them and that all the rest were unprofessional and unable to do their jobs. The woman at the desk tried to treat them well and be reasonable for a very long time, but that didn't work. Finally, she told them, "Fine, we'll just refund your money and you can go somewhere else to stay." This stopped them in their tracks. Their complaining immediately stopped and they turned and left. Why did it have to come to that?

My friend reflected to me, "Life is a mirror. It gives back to us what we give to it. People will treat us as we treat them, and they'll remember our rudeness – and the next time we show up where they work or live, we'll be treated based on how they remember us treating them."

There are many reasons to change our attitudes to more positive and loving ones – but the most important reason of all is to turn our own lives into positive experiences that allow us to be happy and fulfilled. That can come only from us and not from any other source. The world will not give us the conditions that will nurture happiness and fulfillment until we show to the world a face that is ready for both.

So this year maybe you want to reflect with me on these two questions: What kind of attitude do you generally give to the world? What kind of attitude does the world generally give to you in return? Turn your gaze inward. If you wonder why people treat you as they do, look inside and discover the face that you're giving to the world. And once you determine that... decide how you want the world to treat you and present a face that will attract just that kind of treatment. Correct yourself and your world will change.

Why We Give

In his book, "Giving to God", Mark Allen Powell wrote, "We are invited to put money in the offering plate on Sunday morning not because the church needs our money but because we want and need to give it."

For many of us, this may fly in the face of our typical notion of giving our offering. We may have been brought up thinking we give because the church has bills. There is a building that has upkeep and expenses, staff needs to receive a salary and there is the larger church that receives our support also. In essence, we give because of the need of others.

While this is true, this is not the primary reason why we receive an offering during our worship service. If we simply view giving as a way to meet budget needs then we most likely will not find a whole lot of joy in giving, we will view it as we view paying our gas or electric bill for our home.

As Allen points out, if giving is simply to meet the budgetary expenses, then why is this part of the service at all? We should simply have dues and let everyone know their share. But if we give because we recognize our need and desire to give, then offering becomes an act of worship and it changes our motivation for giving. We turn from meeting an obligation to "expressing our love of God in the purest way imaginable, by giving up something that we value."

This is, in essence, why we receive an offering during our worship service. Yes, it helps to pay the bills, but more importantly, it is a way for us to actively participate in and recognize and express our emotions to God. This is why it is part of our worship service.

The Holiday Season is a Time for Giving... What's a gift you can give that costs you nothing? Well... you may think of others but here's one you may not have considered. A pint of blood. That's all – a pint of blood. Did you know?

- The gift of blood is the gift of life there is no substitute for blood and the only way to get it is from a donor.
- Every two seconds, someone in the United States needs blood.
- Only 5% of the eligible population donates blood.
- 4.5 million American lives are saved each year by blood transfusions.
- Blood is perishable red blood cells have a usable lifespan of 42 days and platelets must be used within 5 days of donation.
- Approximately 450 donors are needed every day to meet the transfusion needs of our community hospitals.

Our Wellness Team is offering you an opportunity to give this free gift at our January Blood Drive. Why January you ask? *Because there is traditionally a shortage of donated blood in the winter months.* So the Wellness Team will be hosting a Miller Memorial Blood Drive here at Hope on Sunday, January 10th from 8:00 AM through 1:00 PM in Kuntz Hall. We are making it conveniently easy for you to donate before or after church – without leaving the building!

Wellness Team members will be setting appointments for blood donations on Sunday, **December 20th, 27th and January 3rd** before and after worship services. If you are unsure whether or not you are an eligible donor the team members will have additional information about who qualifies. Please stop by their table to make an appointment. MORE FROM THE WELLNESS TEAM

January is glaucoma Awareness Month

Glaucoma is a condition that causes damage to your eye's optic nerve and gets worse over time. It's often associated with a buildup of pressure inside the eye. Glaucoma tends to be inherited and may not show up until later in life.

The increased pressure, called intraocular pressure, can damage the optic nerve, which transmits images to the brain. If damage to the optic nerve from high eye pressure continues, glaucoma will cause permanent loss of vision. Without treatment, glaucoma can cause total permanent blindness within a few years.

Because most people with glaucoma have no early symptoms or pain from this increased pressure, it is important to see your eye doctor regularly so that glaucoma can be diagnosed and treated before long-term visual loss occurs.

If you are over age 40 and have a family history of glaucoma, you should have a complete eye exam with an eye doctor every one to two years. If you have health problems such as diabetes or a family history of glaucoma or are at risk for other eye diseases, you may need to visit your eye doctor more frequently.


LEARNING MINISTRIES DAY

Perhaps you or someone you know needs someone to talk to. The streets can be a lonely and difficult place to live. Whether you or someone you know is sleeping in the woods, on the streets, in a car, or just couch surfing, you can be sure we're here to help.

The Synergy Project can offer... Survival supplies (food, clothing, hygienic products, sleeping bags, tents, tarps, etc...); peer support; information and referral services; and assistance to get you off the streets, if desired.

If you allow us to assist you... You can do so without giving your name and without any strings attached. If you need to talk, we can listen; if you are cold and hungry, we can provide a blanket and food; and if you need a safe place to go, we can help direct you to that safe place.
