

GREETINGS FROM THE PASTOR... From Pastor Jami Possinger

Recently my husband, Mitch, sent me an article to read. It is called "How to Leave a Mark on People." The

article outlines some interesting concepts about how people and organizations leave a mark on people. While it does not specifically talk about religious organizations, I was extremely interested in how it can be applied to our congregation. Let me share some of those insights...



The author says clearly that "some organizations are thick, and some are thin. Some leave a

mark on you, and some you pass through with scarcely a memory... which raises two questions: What makes an institution thick? If you were setting out consciously to create a thick institution, what features would it include?" But just what does a thick organization look like?

- A thick institution becomes part of a person's identity and engages the whole person: head, hands, heart and soul. So thick institutions have a physical location where members meet face to face on a regular basis like a dinner table or a packed gym or assembly hall.
- Thick institutions have a set of collective rituals fasting or reciting or standing in formation. They have shared tasks, which often involve members closely watching one another.
- Thick organizations often tell and retell a sacred origin story about themselves. Many experienced a moment when they nearly failed, and they celebrate the heroes who pulled them from the brink. They incorporate music into daily life, because it is hard not to become bonded with someone you have sung and danced with. They have a common ideal encapsulated in a common mission that can be repeated by members such as our core purpose statement.
- Thick institutions have a different moral ecology people tend to like the version of themselves that is called forth by such places.
- Thick organizations think in terms of virtue and vice. They take advantage of people's desire to do good and arouse their higher longings. Thick organizations often see themselves on a vertically – people are members so they can collectively serve the same higher good.
- Thin organizations on the other hand look to take advantage of people's strengths and treat people as resources to be marshaled.
- Thin organizations are often very utilitarian where the members ask: Is this working for me? Am I getting more out than I'm putting in?
- In other words, thin institutions tend to see themselves horizontally people are members for mutual benefit – not necessarily to serve a common good – think country clubs.

All this gets me to thinking – is Hope Lutheran Church a thick organization? And my answer – without patting our own backs – is yes – or at least we are working on being thick! As I reflect on our ministry I see people moving beyond themselves to serve others. I see us gathering face-to-face over meals, worship, communion, service projects – incorporating our heads, hands, hearts and souls to work for Jesus. I look at our collective rituals as we sing and dance in worship – retelling our stories of love and community and service. I see groups of people working for a higher good – whether they are able to articulate that or not. I observe us utilizing people's strengths as resources to be lifted up and used in building up the kingdom of God.

Are we perfect? Certainly not. Do some of us wonder sometimes what is in it for us? Of course – because we are only human. But for the most part – we are a thick organization. So let's celebrate and keep moving toward being the thickest organization we can be!

PASTOR BRIAN'S PREPONDERANT BUSINESS

Christ is Risen! Alleluia! Holy Week was an incredible experience and Easter Sunday was beautiful. During



this wonderful season something I've always wondered about Easter is why so many disciples were unable to recognize Jesus at first when he appeared to them. In the Gospel of John Mary Magdalene thinks Jesus is the gardener until he says her name. In Luke, two of Jesus' followers walk with him on the road to Emmaus and don't realize who he is until hours later "in the breaking of the bread".

Now I wonder two things. First is a more metaphysical question: what is it about Jesus' resurrected body that makes him different from before? He still has his scars where the nails pierced him, so a lot of how he looked must have been the same right? And secondly, I wonder what this all means for us today. Maybe the early church wanted to emphasize Jesus' disciples not recognizing him because so often we don't Jesus in the world. It's a call to pay attention. When we don't expect him, when don't look for him, when don't have eyes to see him, we don't see Jesus.

So how can we prepare our eyes and our hearts and minds to see Jesus? We can come to church and share fellowship with other members of the Body of Christ. We can read the Bible or other spiritual devotions and hear the Spirit's still small voice. We can walk on a beautiful spring evening and witness the glory of creation. We can sit in silent contemplation and find God dwelling in us, the heart of our own hearts. And if we really challenge ourselves, we can see Jesus in the eyes of others. In the eyes of a child. In the smile of a stranger we pass by on our way out of a restaurant. In the gaze of a homeless man on the side of the street. As Mother Teresa once said, "I see Jesus in every human being. I say to myself, this is hungry Jesus, I must feed him. This is sick Jesus. This one has leprosy or gangrene; I must wash him and tend to him." When we truly learn to see Jesus we are better able to act as Jesus ourselves, and we make the love of Jesus visible in the world. When we see Jesus in others, like Mother Teresa did and like Jesus calls us to (Matthew 25) we are training our eyes to a divine way of seeing, and we're making Jesus visible for others to see by the way we live out our faith. And then we can truly recognize: Jesus is everywhere! He is risen indeed, Alleluia!

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A MONEY MOMENT

Well we have reached the end of the budget's first quarter, and we are holding steady. As of the end of March we are \$4,000 in the red (loss). We have absorbed some heavier than anticipated expenses due to our December computer hack (\$2,000) and winter snow plowing /salting expense. Later in the year we will recoup some of the plowing/salting expense from the County Office of Aging for keeping the Senior Center open. Anyway, what I really wanted to mention is the ongoing work on keeping Hope Lutheran's facilities looking nice and fresh. Money from Hope's Building fund is used for additions, major renovations and large refurbishment projects. Some of the scheduled work for this year will be repainting Kuntz Hall (\$7,400), repairing the rear sliding partitions in Kuntz Hall (\$4,500), and replacing the air conditioner units for Hanson Hall (currently in the bidding process). Other projects which may be looked at for this year or 2018 will be repairing the fiber glass steeple (leaking rain water), repairing/replacing the concrete steps into Kuntz Hall,

and new carpeting for the hallway outside the Pastor's offices.

So, don't forget to occasionally add an additional check for Hope's Building Fund when handing in your envelope. You can also designate the building fund through electronic giving.

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS – APRIL 2017

- Council approved the request for Hope to be a voter polling location for Lehigh Township for the May and November 2017 elections.
- The summer worship surveys results were reviewed. 214 members responded to the survey which requested members to weigh in on the proposal of moving to one 9:00 AM service during the summer or maintaining two services. One a scale of 1 to 5 (with 5 indicating highly in favor of having one service), 80% of respondents answered with a 4 or 5 (60% of members selected 5 and 20% of members selected 4). Acting on that input, council approved one service at 9:00 AM during the summer season beginning with Sunday, June 18th and going through Sunday, September 3rd. We will reflect on this decision in the fall.
- t Kuntz Hall painting is moving along. Walls will be repainted, cove molding replaced and the rear folding wall will be "reskinned".
- The Stewardship Committee is hosting another "The Church Has Left the Building" event on Sunday, May 21st. The afternoon will begin with a luncheon following the 10:30 AM service after which members will launch into service activities in the community and at the church. The day will end at 3:00 PM with an ice cream social sponsored by Thrivent Financial. Sign-up sheets will be posted in the narthex for members to choose an area to serve.
- * National Day of Prayer is Thursday, May 4th and the Evangelism Committee will celebrate with a prayer service at 11:30 AM followed by a light lunch for all who participate.
- The youth group is busy with loads of social activities and many fundraisers as they prepare for the 2018 ELCA Youth Gathering.

WELLNESS TEAM Mental Health and Self-injury

Self-injury, also called self-harm, self -mutilation, or simply cutting, is defined as any intentional injury to one's own body. Usually, self-injury leaves marks or causes tissue damage. Self-injury can involve any of the following behaviors: cutting, burning (or "branding" with hot objects), excessive body or tattooing, picking at skin or re-opening wounds, hair-pulling (trichotillomania), head-banging, hitting (with hammer or other object), and bone-breaking.



Self-injury occurs across the spectrum; the behavior is not limited by education, age, race, sexual orientation, socioeconomic status, or religion.


Self-injury usually occurs when people face what seem like overwhelming or distressing feelings. It can also be an act of rebellion and/or rejection of parents' values and a way of individualizing oneself.

Self-injury also may be a reflection of a person's self-hatred. Some self-injurers are punishing themselves for having strong feelings that they were usually not allowed to express as children. They also may be punishing themselves for somehow being bad and undeserving. These feelings are an outgrowth of abuse and a belief that the abuse was deserved.

Although self-inflicted injury may result in life-threatening damage, it is not considered to be suicidal behavior. Look for more information on the bulletin board.
