

SUMMARY:

Expenses exceeded income in the Regular Fund for the month of September by \$5,470.91, and for the year 2018, expenses exceeded income by \$13,391.30, giving us a current balance in the Regular Fund of \$79,450.25. Last year the net income for the same period was \$(15,804.06) with a balance of \$64,539.94.

GREETINGS FROM THE PASTOR...

We often talk about the church as a community. In our western, individualized society, it is sometimes hard to realize just how interrelated we are with other people. And yet — our lives are intertwined with the lives of others in ways that we are sometimes unaware. Whether we like to admit it — or not — we are social creatures and much of what we are as human beings we owe to other people.

Especially in the church – most of us have people who have influenced our faith. Sometimes those people are our parents or grandparents – sometimes they are people who loved us and were patient with us when we were bratty teenagers. Some were teachers, pastors, youth leaders, Sunday School teachers who, in small or large ways, helped us grow and nurtured us in life and in our faith. They remind us that we are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses – people from our past – people in our present – people who will influence us in the future.

All Saints' Sunday is the day we set apart to honor those people who influenced us – and those people whom we will influence. There is some debate about where the celebration of All Saints originated. According to some sources, All Saints' Day goes back to the 4th century when the Greek Christians kept a festival on the first Sunday after Pentecost to honor all martyrs and saints. Other sources say that a

commemoration of "All Martyrs" began to be celebrated as early as 270 CE. Pope Gregory IV made All Saints' Day an official festival in 837 CE. It is speculated that the date of November 1st may have been an attempt to compete with the pagan Festival of the Dead.

In the Lutheran Church we believe that we are made saints - made holy - in our baptism. So...on All Saints' Sunday we don't just celebrate people who died in faith - we also remember ALL Christians past and present - as holy in God's eyes.

During our liturgy on All Saints' Sunday we gather in a darkened worship space – solemn and somber – as we prepare to name and celebrate those who died in faith in the past year. We read their names and light a candle in their memory – the light reminding us that Jesus, the light of the world, has overcome the darkness of death. Music is more subdued as we offer our members the opportunity to come forward and place a votive around the altar in memory of people they love and who have died in faith.

Gradually, the worship space brightens as we begin to celebrate the lives of those made saints through their baptism in the past year. Balloons rise as we read their names – symbolizing our lives rising from (Continued on page 4)

PASTOR BRIAN'S PREPONDERANT BUSINESS

November has always been a month when I remember what I'm thankful for. With Thanksgiving at the end of the month, the time leading up to it can be used as time to reflect on the gifts we've been given and all the blessings we have in life. And while Thanksgiving is not a religious holiday, it certainly offers us a chance to consider all the blessings God has given us. The human brain has a way of focusing on the negative. It's been said 'the positive' slides off our brain like Teflon and 'the negative' sticks to our brain like Velcro. Biologically this has purpose as it has helped our survival as a species, because it's more important to think about the lion that could kill you than about the pretty flowers that smell nice. However, this has led to a modern tendency to always reflect on the negative, and reveals just how much we need to train our minds to intentionally count our blessings and focus on the positive.

The practice of thanksgiving and gratefulness is a wonderful spiritual practice, especially this time of year. In the past I've done an exercise to take five minutes and write as quickly as possible as many things I can think

the waters of baptism to live out our calling to be followers of Jesus in the world.

Eventually the sanctuary is brightly lit as we, together, worship joyfully – celebrating those who have died, those who were baptized and those who stand

worshipping with us. It is the great cloud of witnesses rejoicing with ALL the saints. I hope you will join us for worship on Sunday, November 4th as we celebrate the Saints.

In addition to the beauty of the world and the beauty of relationships, we can reflect on the mystery of life and feel intense gratitude. 
