GREETINGS FROM THE PASTOR...

I read this quote by Cherie Carter-Scott the other day: "Anger makes you smaller, while forgiveness forces you to grow beyond what you were." Now I don't know about you but I've experienced first-hand how anger makes me feel - and I really don't like it. I understand what she means when she says that anger makes us smaller because the times that I've been angry have not always been the best of times for me. Everyone has to deal with anger. The challenge is to deal with anger in the right way.

Anger is a powerful emotional warning that something is wrong. We have been hurt or rejected. Something has changed and we don't like it. The longer I work with people the more I realize that there is always a reason for their behavior. Hurt people - hurt people. When you are angry at someone, ask yourself why. Think back to what led up to the conflict. Was it something someone said to you? Has a past problem triggered your present anger?

The truth is - anger itself is not wrong – in fact it is important to express our anger. Many of us just stay angry without ever expressing it and that can be even more damaging than letting our anger out. We just have to learn to express anger in the right way. Mishandled anger is destructive but anger that is handled correctly can become a tool for good and a tool that leads to forgiveness.

When we're thinking completely objectively, it's pretty easy to see the advantages of forgiveness over anger. Forgiveness keeps us focused on love, and it recognizes another person's right to make mistakes without being severely punished for them. True forgiveness allows us to let go of anger and resentment - freeing up our minds and spirits to allow them to focus on more important things such as love and compassion.

Anger, on the other hand, keeps us focused on what we perceive to be negative incidents or actions. It keeps us dwelling in the past as long as we keep running over in our mind the awful things that someone has done. It holds us as its prisoner, and our minds and spirits are not free to find positive and constructive things upon which to stay focused - we hold them back because we like to feel the self-righteousness that comes with most anger.

Sure it's true that a lot of anger is justified - but as we hold on to it, it becomes less and less justified, **and** more and more destructive. The best way to deal with anger is to face it directly and then let it go - not because someone else has bent to our will and begged forgiveness, but because we're willing to forgive and move on with our lives and keep growing as human beings.

God created us with the capacity for emotions. That means there is a right place for emotions in our lives. Anger management and forgiveness are really spiritual disciplines that honor, bless and empower us to live in harmony with God and with others.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

We are approaching the half way point of our fiscal year. Overall financially we are having a pretty decent year. If you make adjustments for the various things that have occurred after our budget was approved last fall we are still pretty much on track. I am not going to bore you with a lot of numbers but I did want you to know we are about 5% behind last year's numbers with respect to our General & Plate receipts which is something we are keeping an eye on. As you may know, the church has had a few unexpected property related expenses this year. We have made some roof repairs, purchased a new stove and had to remove a BIG tree. We also still have a few capital improvement projects yet to come, most notably and the most expensive of which is the concrete stair/A.D.A. ramp project of Hanson Hall. This project alone will cost us about \$19,000 to \$20,000. So please keep HOPE's financial needs in mind as we enter the summer and fall months ahead.

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS JUNE 2019

- The Annual Church Picnic is being held at Indian Trial Park on Sunday, July 14, beginning at 11:00 a.m.

2019 SYNOD ASSEMBLY HIGHLIGHTS

On Saturday, June 1, approximately 500 delegates and visitors gathered at Genetti Ballrooms Inn & Suites in Hazleton for Northeastern PA Synod Assembly 2019. The day began with a Festival Worship Service led by Bishop Zeiser and synod Vice-President Kristen Edelman-Weiner. An offering of \$3,600 was collected for World Hunger. In his sermon, Bishop Zeiser spoke of a "stirring" within us when we recognize the active presence of God in our life. Driven by faith, we become convinced that we "are onto something"; and we then are compelled to see it through. The result is ministry, ministry built on the generations of Christians who likewise were convinced that they were onto something. However, the past, no matter how great, is sometimes unhelpful for this time. Our theme "Freed in Christ for a New Day" reminds us that it is indeed a new time; and it further reminds us of who it is that got us here, and who will come again.



Bishop Zeiser reviewed some of the mission and ministry of our Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod during the past year. He then talked about challenges that the next bishop (to be elected at Assembly 2020) will face. He emphasized that many congregations will be facing challenging situations; and that it is critically important for both congregations and rostered ministers to commit to building a collegial relationship with the new bishop and his or her staff as together they face the immense challenges to come.

After the morning session, the delegates and visitors adjourned for a luncheon in recognition of the 50th anniversary of the Synod receiving its charter. They enjoyed their meal under a large tent on a beautiful spring afternoon.

Several individuals were elected to offices in the synod: Synod Vice President: Kristen Edelman-Weiner; Synod Secretary: The Rev. Carl Shankweiler; Synod Council-Clergy: The Rev. Cheryl Meinschein; Synod Council-Lay Female: Ruth Major; Synod Council-Lay Male: Thomas Engle; Reports from Synod Officers Resolutions.

The Assembly adopted two resolutions. The first was a major revision of "Continuing Resolutions" offered by Synod Council to bring them up to date with current practice. The second was a resolution that the Youth, Young Adult, and Family Ministry Team address the need for synodical youth leadership; and that this Team work with the Transition Team that will report to the new bish-(Continued on page 8)

JULY IS NATIONAL MENTAL HEALTH MONTH

A mental illness is a condition that affects a person's thinking, feeling or mood. Such conditions may affect someone's ability to relate to others and function each day. Every person will have different experiences, even people with the same diagnosis. Recovery, including meaningful roles in social life, school and work, is possible, especially when you start treatment early and play a strong role in your own recovery process.

A mental health condition isn't the result of one event. Research suggests multiple, linking causes. Genetics, environment and life-style influence whether someone develops a mental health condition. A stressful job or home life makes some people more susceptible, as do traumatic life events like being the victim of a crime. Biochemical processes and circuits and basic brain structure may play a role, too. One in 5 adults experiences a mental health condition every year. One in 17 lives with a serious mental illness such as schizophrenia or bipolar disorder. In addition to a person's directly experiencing a mental illness, family, friends and communities are also affected. Half of mental health conditions begin by age 14, and 75% of mental health conditions develop by age 24. The normal personality and behavior changes of adolescence may mimic or mask symptoms of a mental health condition. Early engagement and support are crucial to improving outcomes and increasing the promise of recovery.
