GREETINGS FROM THE PASTOR...

Recently a friend confided to me that she was having a difficult time with a person in her congregation. She described the situation and how this man would constantly pick at my friend's ministry. If she preached a great sermon - it was too long. If she led a meeting - it was not organized enough. She made too many visits or she didn't make enough visits, according to the complainer. As I listened to the litany of grievances, I quietly said to my friend, "It sounds like this guy is a sandpaper person." And with that, conversation stopped. She asked me, "What is a sandpaper person?" And I told her that is the name I give people who are constantly rubbing me raw – like sandpaper. She asked how I deal with people like that and our conversation drifted to how do you confront sandpaper people in Christian love. So here are some simple tips for effective confrontation - done the loving way:

- 1. Always begin confrontation with affirmation. Encouraging words set the stage and prepare the heart to hear words of correction.
- 2. Be willing to take your part of the blame. No conflict is ever totally one-sided. Taking your share of the blame often diffuses anger.
- Express hurt not hostility. It is important to keep emotions under control during confrontation. Volume negates listening. Raised voices and angry words slam the door shut on any possible good that can come from confrontation. Sandpaper people rarely realize the depth of the pain they inflict.
- Avoid using words like "never" and "always." These words are untrue and accomplish little in a confrontation. They tend to stir up emotions and fan emotional fires.

- 5. Listen. Many of us use the time the other person is speaking to formulate our next point. As a result, we don't listen because we assume we already know what will be said. Difficult conversations require total attention. Listening validates people and invites people into your life. Refusing to listen is arrogant and self-centered.
- 6. Be solution-centered. Make the decision beforehand to stay at the table of confrontation until a solution is found and some measure of restoration is achieved. It is so easy to go for the "let's get this over with" conversation instead of getting to the heart of the problem.
- Make clear, direct statements. Write down what you plan to say - then read it aloud. You can go back and eliminate unnecessary comments, inflammatory words or vengeful statements.
- 8. Remember that you can be dead right about the facts and altogether wrong about the truth. Someone making a rude comment to us can make us upset because the fact is obvious this person made a rude comment. The truth of the matter isn't as simple as "this is a rude person." We can't know what's going on in the person's life that might have caused him or her to make such a comment. Perhaps they've just lost a job, or their spouse is leaving them, or their daughter has just run away from home. Facts aren't necessarily truth. There almost always is more to the picture than we actually can see especially with sandpaper people.

Here's the truth . . . the sandpaper people in your life are likely to be confronted on a regular basis. But because that confrontation usually comes from an angry spirit, it can easily become just another notch in that sandpaper person's belt giving them one more reason to be who they are – difficult. When love and gentleness deliver correction, it is much more likely to be received and acted upon. We can be caring **and** confronting at the same time. Most sandpaper people are controllers and manipulators - intimidating their way into other people's lives - because it is the only way they know to get in. Loving confrontation is a spiritual exercise and an act that changes lives and builds healthy relationships. Try it when you are dealing with a sandpaper person in your life.

FALL CHOIR REHEARSALS RESUME

Choir rehearsals will soon be underway for the fall season and choir members will be anxiously awaiting the fall anthem line up. What anthems will be on the new list? Which of our favorite anthems will we repeat? And what is the annual "dreaded" anthem? Some of the anthems that have already been requested are "Down to the River to Pray" and "Bound for Greater Things". But surprisingly, the most requested favorite anthem this year was "Shout to the Lord" ("Mwimbieni Bwana") which we sang in Swahili.

Our six-member Youth Choir started singing more contemporary anthems. "Grace Wins" was by far the favorite this year. We also sang some three-part anthems, which if you do the math puts only two singers on each voice part. If one person is missing, someone is singing alone with no help. They are an amazing group and have done amazing things this year.

While some of our choir members are trained musicians, most singers have limited musical experience. Ample advance rehearsal time, style variations and a strategic schedule that intersperses easy anthems periodically with difficult anthems provides a relaxing atmosphere conducive to any level of musical skill. In other words, "No experience necessary."

Our **adult choir** rehearses weekly on Thursdays from 7 PM to 8:30 PM in the sanctuary. They sing weekly and split between the 8 AM and 10:30 AM services. Our first rehearsal will be on Thursday, September 19 at 7 PM. We are always in need of sopranos, altos, tenors and basses. Please call the church office to obtain a code to enter the building for rehearsals.

Our **youth choir** rehearsals change yearly based upon singers' schedules. The youth choir schedule is flexible and they sing when they are available. Which service they sing at is selected by the singers the week before singing. This may sound complicated, but it works with busy schedules. If interested in singing with our youth choir, please email your child's availability for weeknight rehearsals. I will contact you for more information and when a rehearsal day has been selected. This past year, youth choir rehearsals were on Tuesday evenings from 6:30 PM to 7:30 PM. Youth choir is open to anyone school age through high school.

Finally, our in-house church orchestra is always looking for new members. Unlike our vocal ensembles, the orchestra has a 2 year minimum playing experience requirement. If you have been playing a musical instrument for at least 2 years, you are welcome to join our orchestra. The orchestra has a survey rehearsal policy where I survey members on service and rehearsal availability. Music is then selected for the service based upon instrumentation and rehearsals are scheduled according to availability. The orchestra has no fixed rehearsal day or time. We rehearse specifically for one event at a time so membership is flexible with no long term commitments. The orchestra typically plays on All Saints Sunday (first Sunday in November), Christmas Eve, Easter and Pentecost.

For students who are just learning a musical instrument, we have a limited supply of used student model instruments for members to borrow. Please contact me if you are interested in borrowing any instrument and to check availability.

anthems, recordings, orchestrations and an ever-expanding choir library. But alas after 27 years, the inevitable has come; the day of reckoning has arrived and I heard those words, "I'm painting your office"! (Start the horror music here!)

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS-AUGUST 2019

- Hope's Sunday School welcomes students back for a Carnival on Sunday, September 8 from 9:00 a.m.– 11:00 a.m. Many activities for children will be available including pony rides, crafts, a bounce house and more. Refreshments will be provided. This is a free event for the community.
- Sunday School Coordinators for the 2019-2020 year are: Allison Lockard, Steph Maurer and Shelbey Ziegler. They have been working hard to introduce a new curriculum and integrate more technology into our classrooms.
- Council approved a prudent investment of \$25,000.00 from the checking account into a Thrivent account that will be diversified in a variety of low risk funds. An initial \$15,000.00 will open the account and an additional \$1,000.00 will be deposited each month for 10 months. The Finance Committee will review this on a monthly basis and continue to monitor the performance of this fund as they do with Hope's other investments.
- Hope is continuing to provide backpacks and nonperishable nutritious food to students at Moore Elementary School who may be experiencing food insufficiency. Please check the newsletter and bulletins for suggested items to donate.
- The Stewardship Committee is hosting a Family Movie Night on Saturday, October 19, where they will be showing the Halloween movie, "Hocus Pocus." Doors open at 6:00 p.m. and the movie will be shown at 6:30 p.m. Free hot dogs, pizza, drinks, ice cream treats, popcorn and candy will be served.
- The concrete project to replace the steps and add a handicapped accessible ramp on the Kuntz Hall side of the building continues to move forward. That entrance to the building will be closed until the railings are installed.
