GREETINGS FROM THE PASTOR...

As I write this article it is Memorial weekend the opening volley of the summer months. We expected to be able to participate in picnics and fireworks - family gatherings and remembrance services for fallen heroes. But not this year. At least not in the ways we have celebrated in the past. Although many of us have hoped for a neat finale to this pandemic, I am coming to realize that there will be no quick return to life the way it was before March 2020. I'm sure you have come to that realization as well.

I am asking myself questions like: How do we move forward when so many decisions are based on the unknown of this virus? How do we find ways to cope as Covid19 continues to loom over us? How do we continue to be the church beyond our building? There are no easy answers – which can lead to heightened anxiety, increased frustration and loss of hope. It is important to keep "readjusting our horizons" according to Dr. Amelia Aldao, a psychologist specializing in anxiety. Let me share what she has to say about coping in this pandemic.

"Some of us have our hopes fixed to an event in the future - a July wedding we half-expect to attend, or a September getaway we think just might work out – and that can be problematic. The way things are shaping up, there's a lot of uncertainty - what's going to open? Is there going to be a second wave of outbreaks? We just don't know. "

Looking forward is a positive approach psychologically because it keeps us engaged in life. But given the current circumstances, "Either focus on the right here, right now, the immediate days and weeks - we all have a lot of control over the next week," says Aldao, "Or try focusing on the more distant future - maybe a year from now."

Her advice sounds a lot like the words of wisdom from the US Navy Vice Admiral, James Stockdale, who spent seven years as a prisoner of war in

Vietnam. He is credited with articulating what is known as "Stockdale's paradox" - a "hope for the best, prepare for the worst" philosophy. During his time as a POW he observed his cellmates and their response to captivity. The "optimists," as he classified them, who believed they would be free by Christmas, then, when that didn't happen, by Easter, and so on - became demoralized and "died of a broken heart."

Now we are not prisoners of war - but his wisdom on how to cope with uncertainty still resonates. The truth is that we cannot afford to spend our time during this pandemic expecting normalcy when it is over just because that is what we want. How do we then muddle our way through this without getting totally bogged down in the misery of it?

One way is to make contingency plans – what you will do if someone in your family gets sick - what you will do if you must work from home one more month – what you will do if you cannot take your summer vacation at the beach. Grasping hold of what you can control helps us to allow this time not to be a constant source of sadness.

Another coping mechanism is to imagine sharing the story with your grandchildren or greatgrandchildren 30 or 50 years from now when they ask you what it was like during the great Covid19 pandemic. What things will you tell them brought you hope? Who was instrumental in keeping your spirits up? What funny stories can you share about the time you spent sheltering at home? Which pictures will you share with them - ones of wearing face masks and gloves - ones of walking in the rain - ones of cozy game playing - ones of zoom family gatherings? What are the things that are happening right now that will create memories for you to share when all this is over?

Council Highlights - May 2020

- ♦ Council approved the recommendation from the Worship and Music Committee to begin offering Holy Communion once a month while we are worshiping outside of the building. This will begin the weekend of May 23.
- ♦ Hope will continue to worship at Becky's Drive In as long as it is feasible for them to host us.
- Council discussed the movement to eventually reopening the church for activities and worship. The decision is that the building will remain closed for all worship and social events until the church is in the green zone in accordance with Pennsylvania State government guidelines. The exceptions would be "lifealtering" events (funerals, weddings, baptisms) in which cases social distancing and masks will be enforced with a maximum limit of 10 people in the gathering.
- ♦ VBS Virtual Bible School will be held the week of July 6 10 and will involve a "drive thru" portion where families will drive through the parking lot to learn the theme and story of the day, pick up craft supplies, meet the VBS characters and play car games. Registration is now open at vbs.hopecherryville.org.
- Church finances are holding steady and council thanks our members for their generous support during this time of great disruption in our worship life.
- Confirmation classes are being held via Zoom meetings through May. Confirmation has been postponed until August 23. We would add an additional service that Sunday for Confirmation. This is the tentative date based on the opening of the state into the "green" zone and the ability to safely distance in the sanctuary.
- ◆ The Youth Group is doing virtual events through Zoom meetings in May and June.
- ♦ Book Buddies, Hope's book club, is reading a new book called *Where the Crawdads Sing*. The next virtual meeting via Zoom will be held on June 30 at 1:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. Books are available in the church office for a cost of \$10. Participants may choose the meeting time that works for their schedule. A Zoom link will be posted in the bulletin in June.

YOUTH GROUP

Youth Group is hosting Zoom Game Night events so we can stay connected throughout this time. Our upcoming dates are June 5 and June 19. Links will be sent to parents through email. Hope to see everyone there!

There's something I've been thinking about for awhile now, and what better time to revisit recorded amounts, tally them, and give you a report of total contributions made to the Northampton Area Food Bank and Hope's Good Samaritan Fund.

Spring socials began in 1999 and ran for 21 years, ending in 2019.

In those 21 years a total of \$56,061.90 was donated to the Northampton Area Food Bank and a total of \$48,030.90 was donated to Hope's Good Samaritan Fund.

Note that profits were split equally, however, you see an increased amount to the Food bank because of Thrivent's Matching Fund program during a good portion of that time, whereby the monies were to be added to the community event funds; also for a good part of that time cake monies were being donated to the Food Bank.



GRADUATES, LET US HEAR FROM YOU



A Message from Bishop Zeiser about Opening Church Buildings

As we go through this Memorial Day weekend and begin to experience how it feels for some of us to live under relaxed restrictions, along with the heightened spirits that go with the first holiday weekend in the pre-summer weeks, I hope you have a safe and settled Memorial Day observance. It is important for all of us to recognize the significance of this holiday, and to offer thanks to God for those who made supreme sacrifices for the sake our liberties.

As the threat of the COVID-19 pandemic continues, even in the midst of this holiday, I also want to reiterate my counsel about when and how to open church buildings for worship and other purposes. We cannot allow illusory hope or misguided enthusiasm to push us to unwise decisions about opening, assembling for worship, or gathering for meetings.

The phased and deliberate process of relaxed restrictions in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and in states across the country, requires that we be patient for the sake of those most vulnerable to the corona virus. Some of the most vulnerable are likely among the members of our congregations, as well as among those who visit our churches or participate in the ministries carried out by our congregations. Love of neighbor, central to the understanding we hold of our discipleship role as followers of the Risen Jesus, draws to act in ways that are sacrificial of our own needs and desires.

I encourage all rostered ministers and congregations of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod to abide by the guidelines established by Governor Wolf and to employ the suggested approaches to opening buildings offered by the ELCA Churchwide Office and the Wisconsin Council of Churches. As these guidelines and suggestions have seemed well informed and demand a high level of rigor, I have provided copies of them in previous communications similar to this message. I know, too, that some of you have had access to other helpful and wise resources; I commend your attention to their direction.

The warm personal interaction; the inspired worship; the satisfying mission work in our communities and across the globe; the meaningful opportunities for faith development and spiritual growth; and the unexpected encounters of grace that occur because we step inside beloved church buildings: all of these occasions and more make being part of a congregation life-giving and faith motivating. They are important to me and at the heart of why I am committed to the life and mission of the church; and I know that the same is true for you, too.

I have been so impressed by the creative ways in which congregations and rostered ministers of this synod have directed the faith and the energies of their zeal for compassionate ministries during this awful pandemic. In fact, I have observed a level of enthusiasm, surprise, and renewal in ministers and congregations as they have found new ways to witness to their love of God. The Holy Spirit has stirred in you during this challenging time and you have shown the resilience of your faith. God is at work, and God will continue to do new things for the sake of all people and for all creation no matter how long this pandemic is in effect. Please, don't be drawn into making a premature decision about opening your building.


