GREETINGS FROM THE PASTOR...

How long, Lord? That's a phrase that has popped up in my mind this past month. How long, Lord will this virus last? How long, Lord until we can worship together again in our building at Hope? How long, Lord will these protests last? How long, Lord until people realize that wearing a mask is helping us push back the virus? How long, Lord until our country unifies? How long, Lord?

It's a biblical plea but that got me to thinking just how is it used in the Bible and where. So ... I checked. As a petition directly to God, this phrase is used in Psalms 13:1, 35:17, 80:4 and 90:13 and in the first chapter of the book of Habakkuk. In every one of these verses the writer is calling out to God during some time of distress where God feels absent – or at least not responding as the petitioner would like. Does it sound familiar? I mean don't we just want God to come down here and clean up all these messes? Don't we want God to fix this world?

And while you might say yes to that, God does not work that way. God is not a genie in a bottle who gives us three wishes – or a Santa who asks us for our wish lists. Instead, God is expecting us to partner with God to clean up these messes – to fix the world. God gives us the ability to find the vaccine for the virus and to break down the walls that are dividing us. God empowers us to see the humanity in those who are not like us and to act for the common good of all. The question is: are we willing to embrace these challenges and do the will of God?

How long, Lord? It is a common plea when we are in the midst of despair, distress and uncertainty. And until we find a cure and build bridges between all people and look out for each other and put our own needs aside there are ways we can look at this time in our lives in a different way. Here's what I mean ...

The protests are happening – maybe not in

Cherryville or Danielsville or Northampton — but they are happening. Would it be possible for us to open our minds to read more about why some people in the United States feel disenfranchised? Could we try to see their lives from their perspectives instead of our own? Might we sit down with an African American person and take the time to hear their story?

Wearing masks has become a political issue instead of a way to help protect others from a horrific illness and it is dividing our country more and more every day. I wear a mask to protect you and you wear a mask to protect me. Why is that political? Why isn't it just about the Golden Rule – you know treat others as you would like to be treated? What if we all tried that?

We are six months into this pandemic and I can't wait for us all to be worshiping together again. I know it will be different, but right now I miss you all. But until that time we can come together or go shopping safely or eat in a restaurant without a mask - maybe we could look at the things that have changed and see if any of them have been life-giving. For instance, I didn't see my children or grandchildren who live out of state for 6 months — but I gave thanks every day for the many ways we could communicate and literally see each other. This pandemic has made me realize just how important family is.

We have not been in worship since the first weekend in March. I miss it terribly but realize that the church is not confined to a building and that WE are the church and we can DO church wherever (at a drive-in or a parking lot) and whenever we choose (on a Sunday morning or a Monday night.) Who could have ever imagined doing a Vacation Bible School anywhere but IN our building – but we did VBS outside our building this year. And that has



BLOOD DRIVE

Miller Keystone Blood Mobile will be at Hope in the parking lot on Saturday, September 5 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. There will be a donor every 20 minutes. Your sign-in will be inside the church through the handicapped entrance by Kuntz Hall. There you will stay until called into the mobile unit. All sign-ups will be done online only. If you would like to sign-up, please do so online at www.giveapint.org. Please seriously consider giving. Below are the top 10 reasons for not giving—is one of them yours?



1. I'M AFRAID OF NEEDLES

Often times, the hardest part about deciding to donate blood is overcoming the fear of the needle stick. Many people actually decide to donate to help get over their fear of needles. The actual drawing process should cause very little, if any, discomfort. The finger prick during the preliminary interview process (required to test your iron level) is usually the only slight discomfort encountered by a blood donor.

2. OTHERS ARE DONATING ENOUGH

40% of the US population is eligible to donate blood, yet less than 5% of those eligible do. Blood centers nationwide typically run into blood shortages at various times throughout the year.

In our region alone, over 450 units of blood are needed each day by transfusion patients in area hospitals. Blood is perishable – whole blood can be stored safely for 42 days, while platelets (which are used to treat cancer patients and burn victims) have a shelf-life of only 5 days! Therefore, it is vitally important to maintain a steady stream of blood donors, to ensure the safety and availability of the blood supply for all of us.

3. MY BLOOD TYPE IS NOT IN DEMAND

Blood centers often run short of type O, A and B blood, but shortages of all types occur during the summer and winter holidays. If all eligible donors gave at least twice a year, it would help prevent blood shortages.

4. THEY WOULDN'T WANT MY BLOOD BECAUSE OF THE ILLNESSES I'VE HAD

Many health conditions do not prevent people from donating blood, and the deferral criteria for blood donors is constantly changing, which means that if you were turned down for donation in the past, you may now be eligible to donate.

5. I'M AFRAID OF CATCHING A DISEASE

Donating blood is safer today than it has ever been before. Blood centers follow five layers of safety procedures:

- Careful blood donor eligibility standards
- An individual screening process
- Laboratory testing of all blood samples
- Confidential exclusion of all ineligible donations
- · Donor record checks

During the actual donation process, all donors are given a mini-medical

check-up, and asked a series of questions to ensure that they are eligible to donate for our community blood supply. All questions asked during this process are required by the Food & Drug Administration (FDA). All equipment used in the blood donation process is sterile and disposable (used only once). The needle and all related equipment are disposed of in a specially marked biohazard container immediately following the donation. Therefore, there is no chance of contracting AIDS or any other disease by donating blood.

6. I DON'T HAVE ANY SPARE BLOOD TO DONATE

Blood makes up about seven percent (7%) of your body's weight, and the average adult has approximately two pints of blood for every 25 pounds of body weight. The body is constantly manufacturing blood. After your whole blood donation, you will not be eligible to donate for 56 days (or eight weeks), during which time your body will completely replenish the blood you have so generously donated. You can give platelets every two weeks, up to 24 times per year, plasma every four weeks, and automated red cells every 112 days.

7. MY BLOOD ISN'T RICH ENOUGH

The minimum hematocrit (iron) level to donate blood is 12.5 for females and 13.0 for males. If you are deferred for low hemoglobin, your collections specialist can review ways in which to increase your iron level. In many cases, your iron level can be increased significantly by some simple changes to your diet.

8. I'M AFRAID OF BEING TURNED DOWN

There are many reasons why you might be deferred from donating blood. Some of these deferrals are permanent, while many of them are only temporary. The deferral criteria for blood donors is constantly changing, which means that if you were turned down for donation in the past, you may now be eligible to donate! Click here for our general eligibility guidelines.

9. THEY'LL TAKE TOO MUCH BLOOD AND I'LL FEEL WEAK

Immediately after your blood donation, you will also be asked to spend a few moments in our canteen area, where you will be served refreshments, cookies, and other snacks. This will help replenish some of the sugar and liquids in your body and help us to ensure that you are feeling well after your donation.

10. I'M TOO BUSY

If you, a family member, a co-worker, a neighbor or a friend were in need of a blood transfusion, would you want to hear this excuse? Donating blood is safe and easy, and takes less than an hour. A single blood donation can help as many as three different people! In what other activity can so little time do so much?
