GREETINGS FROM THE PASTOR...

The Lenten season is often used as a time to focus on our lives — the lives we live day to day and our spiritual lives. All of us have some kind of vision for our lives and we plan our lives around that vision. As I look around me, it's interesting to see that most of us "plan" lives that follow socially acceptable definitions of success - money in the bank; a good job; a home and a mortgage; the admiration of friends, family, colleagues, and business partners; diplomas and certificates on the walls. But life — at least the life God wants us to live — is more than degrees and deposits into a savings account.

Just how much of the life you are leading now is the result of your attempts to "forge" the life you want - versus allowing God to push you in certain directions that would be the best for you as a spiritual being who is having a human experience? I mean...if your focus is on building up your bank account - then your desire to be an artist or a musician may slip aside, and you may never lead the life of an artist or a musician. If you put all your effort into climbing the corporate ladder - then you may never travel and learn about other people, cultures, and ways of life. If you spend your entire Sabbath day of rest working or golfing or playing sports instead of spending some time worshiping God, - your relationship with God may suffer. So... what kind of life would you truly like to be living?

During the Lenten season I would like to address that issue with you through our mid-week Lenten services. Our Lenten theme will be "Open

My Life, Lord" – a six-week series that will focus on how we can better open our whole lives to God's influence and instruction. Beginning with Ash Wednesday our evening topics will be:

Ash Wednesday: The Ashes of Our Lives
Week of Lent 1: Open My Eyes, Lord
Week of Lent 2: Open My Hands, Lord
Week of Lent 3: Open My Ears, Lord
Week of Lent 4: Open My Heart, Lord
Week of Lent 5: Open My Life, Lord

Life, truth be told, is always changing – despite our efforts and desires to plan and control and envision. The comedian Gilda Radner once said, "I wanted a perfect ending. Now I've learned, the hard way, that some poems don't rhyme, and some stories don't have a clear beginning, middle, and end. Life is about not knowing, having to change, taking the moment, and making the best of it, without knowing what's going to happen next."

Join us for Lenten worship and see how God is at work shaping you and molding you to be the child of God you are called to be. I can almost guarantee that you will identify with some of the images and characters you will encounter this Lenten season — images and characters who will nudge you to moments of awareness and transformation. Please take time IN your life to think ABOUT your life!

BOOK BUDDIES


We will meet February 23 at 1 and 7 to discuss our latest book, The Screwtape Letters.

<u>The Screwtape Letters</u> is a classic masterpiece of religious satire that entertains readers with its sly and ironic portrayal of human life and foibles from the vantage point of Screwtape, a highly placed assistant to "Our Father Below." At once wildly comic, deadly serious, and strikingly original, C.S. Lewis's The Screwtape Letters is the most engaging account of temptation—and triumph over it—ever written.

Our March read will be Destined to Witness and we will meet March 27 at 1 and 7 for discussion.

<u>Destined to Witness</u> is a story of the unexpected. In *Destined to Witness*, Hans Massaquoi has crafted a

beautifully rendered memoir -- an astonishing true tale of how he came of age as a black child in Nazi Germany. The son of a prominent African and a German nurse, Hans remained behind with his mother when Hitler came to power, due to concerns about his fragile health, after his father returned to Liberia. Like other German boys, Hans went to school; like other German boys, he swiftly fell under the Fuhrer's spell. So he was crushed to learn that, as a black child, he was ineligible for the Hitler Youth. His path to a secondary education and an eventual profession was blocked. He now lived in fear that, at any moment, he might hear the Gestapo banging on the door -- or Allied bombs falling on his home. Ironic,, moving, and deeply human, Massaquoi's account of this lonely struggle for survival brims with courage and intelligence.



Good News for Seniors Over 70-1/2 -A Tax-Free Gift With Your IRA Rollover

Are your required minimum IRA withdrawals greater than you need, or care to receive? Would you like to reduce the taxable income from your IRA?

The IRA charitable rollover is a terrific way to make a tax-free gift to Hope Lutheran Church ministries. Your gift from your IRA can satisfy your Required Minimum Distribution without increasing your Federal income taxes. Although you don't get an income tax charitable deduction for the gift, you don't pay taxes on your IRA withdrawal. In effect, the IRA charitable rollover is a tax-reducing and tax-free way to make a gift.

If you are 70-1/2 or older, you can tell your IRA administrator to transfer your gift directly from your Traditional or Roth IRA account to Hope Lutheran. We can put your gift to use right away in providing financial support to our ministries throughout the Church.

Consider these important requirements to make an IRA charitable rollover:

- * You must be 70-1/2 or older when the gift is made.
- * The gift must come from a Traditional IRA or Roth IRA account. Other retirement accounts such as 401(k) or 403(b) Plans are not eligible.
- * The gift check must come directly from your IRA administrator to Hope Lutheran.
- * Total IRA charitable rollover gifts in any one year cannot exceed \$100,000.
- * The IRA rollover gift can count toward your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) if you have not already taken your RMD for the year you make your gift.
- * The gift from your IRA will be excluded from your taxable income.
- * The gift from your IRA will not be available as an income tax charitable deduction.

If you are interested in making such a gift or if you just want more information, please contact your IRA administrator, tax preparer or the Church Treasurer.

The ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission program invites ELCA young adults ages 21-29 into a transformative, year-long journey in international service. As they offer themselves in service, ELCA young adults are shaped by the witness of our global neighbors. They share in the journeys of companion churches and organizations in one of nine countries around the world.

A year of service through the Young Adults in Global Mission program invites young adults to become the hands and feet of Jesus in the world, providing critical support to ministries and projects in communities of need. It also invites volunteers into a journey of self-reflection, providing space to consider their sense of identity, God's work in the world, and their place within it all.

Young adults serve in the spirit of accompaniment, walking alongside global companions in a manner that practices mutuality, interdependence and solidarity. Areas of service include, but are not limited to, health and development, congregational ministry, human rights, education, homelessness, addiction recovery, women's issues and children and youth. All site placements provide opportunities for young adults to confront issues of wealth and poverty, racial privilege, economic disparity and globalization, all through the lens of faith.

Candidates for Young Adults in Global Mission apply to the program at-large rather than to a specific country. Applicant preferences are taken into account but the final decision about where volunteers serve is made by Global Mission staff and YAGM country coordinators in mid-April. Current YAGM country programs include: <u>Argentina/Uruguay</u>, <u>Jerusalem/West Bank</u>, <u>Mexico</u>, <u>Senegal</u> and <u>United Kingdom</u>

Applications for the 2023-2024 YAGM service year will be open from November 1, 2022 through February 1, 2023.

COMMISSION FOR A RENEWED LUTHERAN CHURCH

Open Nomination: January 9 – March 9, 2023

At the 2022 Churchwide Assembly, voting members adopted a memorial concerning restructuring the ELCA's governance. The assembly adopted 738-72 the following action:

To direct the Church Council to establish a Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church comprised of leaders of diverse representation from all three expressions that, working in consultation with the Conference of Bishops and the Church Council, shall reconsider the statements of purpose for each of the expressions of this church, the principles of its organizational structure, and all matters pertaining thereunto, being particularly attentive to our shared commitment to dismantle racism, and will present its findings and recommendations to the 2025 Churchwide Assembly in preparation for a possible reconstituting convention to be called under the rules for a special meeting of the Churchwide Assembly. [CA22.01.06]

The Church Council discussed the churchwide assembly action at its November 2022 meeting. It authorized the establishment of the Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church (CRLC) to consist of no more than 35 voting members and directed the Executive Committee of the Church Council to initiate the process of forming the commission. [CC22.11.38.]

The nomination process is open until March 9, 2023. More information about the commitment and expectation of serving on the CRLC can be found at www.elca.org/crlc. Interested individuals who wish to be nominated or to nominate another person should complete and submit the nomination form which can be found on the website. The Executive Committee of the Church Council will serve as the nominating committee and will present a slate of nominees to the Church Council at its April 20, 2023 meeting for appointment to the CRLC.

ELCA INTRODUCES JOURNI

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) is pleased to introduce Journi, a web-based tool designed to help people discern their call to leadership in the ELCA.

"Journi encourages all of us to seek out and inspire gifted people in our congregations and communities to consider a call to ministry of the gospel," said the Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, ELCA presiding bishop.

<u>Journi.faith</u> is an online tool that connects people with programs and ministries from across the ELCA. By creating a free account with Journi, a person can take the ELCA Spiritual Gifts Personality Quiz, which will identify their top five spiritual gifts, and receive content recommendations based on those gifts.

"Journi is for anyone who wants to explore how they might follow Christ in love and service," said the Rev. Philip Hirsch, executive for ELCA Christian Community and Leadership. "For those who feel they are called to make the world a better place but don't know exactly what they want to do, Journi will help them find a next step."

Users can also check out upcoming leadership events in the ELCA on the calendar and have access to nine different paths that are similar to small courses that showcase programs and ministries from across the ecology of the ELCA, along with dozens of articles, videos, podcasts, and other resources for users to learn from. Those nine paths are: Called to Lead, Chaplaincy, Choosing the Right Seminary, Connecting Faith & Public Life, Finding Faith on Campus, Get a Scholarship: Fund for Leaders, Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Young Adults in Global Mission, and Youth Leadership.

"Journi is for everyone, not just those who want to become pastors or deacons in the church," Hirsch said. "God calls everyone to love and serve."

SUMMARY:

Income exceeded expenses in the Regular Fund for the month of December by \$20,561.63, and for the year 2022, income exceeded expenses by \$6,834.47, giving us a current balance in the Regular Fund of \$252,035.16. Last year the net income for the same period was \$57,928.49 (which included PPP Loan Forgiveness of \$36,872.23) with a balance of \$246,275.19.
