GREETINGS FROM THE PASTOR...

By the time you read this you will know that I have made the decision to retire from full-time ministry and will be leaving Hope at the end of August 2023. And I am sure that – like me – you feel conflicting emotions. And I would guess part of the reason we feel that way is that most of us do not like change.

That got me to thinking - why is change so hard for us? Maybe we could blame it on our history. If you think about it - until the past few generations, most people's lives stayed very much the same from beginning to end. People grew up where their parents had grown up, did the work their parents had done, believed and knew the things previous generations had believed and known. Change, when it came, was generally an abnormality and a danger.

But these days, the world is different. Major change happens moment to moment — economically, environmentally, sociologically, politically, and organizationally — even in the church. When an organizational change — like what is happening here at Hope - is first proposed, most people immediately want to know three things:

- What does this change mean to me?
- Why is it happening?
- What will it look like when the change has been made?

We gather this information intuitively, to begin to assess the level of risk and difficulty involved in the change. And I'm sure that – like me – you are wondering those very same questions. While I cannot answer them all I can assure you that over the next 6 months we will be working to answer those questions.

However, maybe the question we should be asking is: What is **not** changing? And that is a much easier question to answer. What is not changing at Hope is our incredible worship filled with lively music, faithful assisting ministers, fantastic choirs and instrumental music and Joe's drums. What is not changing is our adult and children's educational programs – Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, Confirmation, Adult Sunday School. They stand on solid ground with a dedicated team of teachers and leaders. What is not changing is the many organizations Hope has that bring fellowship, service and devotional opportunities to members. What is not changing is our council and committee leadership – people who have committed themselves to transitioning this congregation through this time.

I know that this change feels sudden to you all and that, because I have been in a process of discernment, I have had the opportunity to sit with it for a longer period of time. I do not expect you all to be as accepting of the change from the first moment you heard it – but I know that after months of thought and questioning, your mindset will begin to shift.

So here is what I can offer – permission to be worried, to hesitate, to ask questions, to want to know the impact on you, even to be sad or anxious. I will be available to listen, to hold your hand, to pray with you, to encourage you, to be present with you. Because the truth is no one really loves change. It can be exhausting and make us uncomfortable. But change is necessary and a healthy part of life, especially life in the church.

In the months ahead please know that we are in this together – that God has us – that the Spirit is working through us – that we will see this through together.






BOOK BUDDIES

We will meet March 27 at 1 and 7 to discuss the book, *Destined to Witness*. Cost of the book is \$15.

Destined to Witness is a story of the unexpected. In Destined to Witness, Hans Massaquoi has crafted a

beautifully rendered memoir -- an astonishing true tale of how he came of age as a black child in Nazi Germany. The son of a prominent African and a German nurse, Hans remained behind with his mother when Hitler came to power, due to concerns about his fragile health, after his father returned to Liberia. Like other German boys, Hans went to school; like other German boys, he swiftly fell under the Fuhrer's spell. So he was crushed to learn that, as a black child, he was ineligible for the Hitler Youth. His path to a secondary education and an eventual profession was blocked. He now lived in fear that, at any moment, he might hear the Gestapo banging on the door -- or Allied bombs falling on his home. Ironic,, moving, and deeply human, Massaquoi's account of this lonely struggle for survival brims with courage and intelligence.

Good News for Seniors Over 70-1/2—A Tax-Free Gift With Your IRA Rollover

Are your required minimum IRA withdrawals greater than you need, or care to receive? Would you like to reduce the taxable income from your IRA?

The IRA charitable rollover is a terrific way to make a tax-free gift to Hope Lutheran Church ministries. Your gift from your IRA can satisfy your Required Minimum Distribution without increasing your Federal income taxes. Although you don't get an income tax charitable deduction for the gift, you don't pay taxes on your IRA withdrawal. In effect, the IRA charitable rollover is a tax-reducing and tax-free way to make a gift.

If you are 70-1/2 or older, you can tell your IRA administrator to transfer your gift directly from your Traditional or Roth IRA account to Hope Lutheran. We can put your gift to use right away in providing financial support to our ministries throughout the Church.

Consider these important requirements to make an IRA charitable rollover:

- * You must be 70-1/2 or older when the gift is made.
- * The gift must come from a Traditional IRA or Roth IRA account. Other retirement accounts such as 401(k) or 403(b) Plans are not eligible.
- * The gift check must come directly from your IRA administrator to Hope Lutheran.
- * Total IRA charitable rollover gifts in any one year cannot exceed \$100,000.
- * The IRA rollover gift can count toward your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) if you have not already taken your RMD for the year you make your gift.
- * The gift from your IRA will be excluded from your taxable income.
- * The gift from your IRA will not be available as an income tax charitable deduction.

If you are interested in making such a gift or if you just want more information, please contact your IRA administrator, tax preparer or the Church Treasurer.
